We can have an Earthly Perspective or an Eternal Perspective:

1. An earthly perspective yields sinful attitudes.

A perspective is a point of view, a way of thinking about a matter. Having an eternal perspective means evaluating the beliefs, events, decisions and actions of life from God's point of view. It is using God's values as the measuring stick with which we evaluate life. It is recognizing that everything done in the present has an eternal consequence and should be evaluated in that light. Martin Luther once said that on his calendar there were but two days, "today and that day." He recognized that every day of this life is preparation for the day when we will stand before God in eternity. I can view the world through "spiritual eyes", with God's perspective or I can simply view the world through "physical eyes" and fail to grasp the eternal. My view of life will greatly affect my thinking and my actions.

Doubt can limit our walk with God...

3. An eternal perspective from God yields understanding.

Verse 17

Ephesians 4:18

18 They are darkened in their <u>understanding</u> and separated from the life of God because of the ignorance that is in them due to the hardening of their hearts.

Think about a couple walking through a maze made of hedges. The husband and wife can see only the path ahead of them. They try one way, only to find a dead end. But imagine if the couple could have a bird's-eye view of the maze. They could see the beginning from the end, the dead ends from the fruitful paths. That's what God's eternal perspective is like. He sees and understands it all. Grasping and embracing God's eternal perspective will help us understand many things about our lives. To gain that perspective and understanding, we must read His Word, listen to Him in prayer, and be willing to follow His directions.

God will also help us understand what, from His perspective, is truly eternal. God is eternal, so our relationship to Him is very important. Scripture is eternal, so we commit ourselves to studying and memorizing it. People are eternal, so we invest ourselves in our marriages, our families, and our friendships. By contrast, material things are not eternal, so we should spend less time, energy, and money on grasping for them.

Psalms 119:104

104 I gain understanding from your precepts

While the Psalmist had focused on what the wicked had, he failed to notice the many blessings that the righteous enjoy now. Now that he sees from a heavenly perspective, he understands that he and other godly people have the riches of untold value. He had envied the glitter of the wicked while all along he had the real gold.

Every believer can say, "I have security that is greater than that of money or success." I can have peace even during troubled times because I am held by his strong right hand. I can walk through the valley of the shadow of death and fear no evil because God is my protector. The wicked has a peace that is temporal and fickle. It has a habit of disappearing when trouble ultimately comes. As a believer I can have cancer and still have peace. As a believer I can be unemployed and still be at rest in my heart. As a believer, because I am protected by God's mighty hand, I can be surrounded by trouble and still sleep at night with a quiet heart. ---Commentary

4. An eternal perspective yields confidence.

Verse 23-26

Psalms 27:1-3

The LORD is my light and my salvation — whom shall I fear? The LORD is the stronghold of my life — of whom shall I be afraid? 2 When evil men advance against me to devour my flesh, when my enemies and my foes attack me, they will stumble and fall. 3 Though an army besiege me, my heart will not fear; though war break out against me, even then will I be <u>confident</u>.

The glory and joy of our eternal heavenly reward is so great that it is incomprehensible and indescribable. After considering the riches that the righteous have now and the reward that they experience later in heaven, Asaph stands in awe and in appreciation of the many blessings he has. In heaven, with God, the believer has the best that is available; and on all the Earth there is nothing greater or better than God himself. The believer is blessed on earth with God's many riches, but unlike the wicked the believer will also be blessed in the future with a reward that cannot be comprehended. In verse 26 he is basically saying that even if he were to experience trouble and sickness all the days of his life, even if his heart and his flesh were to fail, he was still better off than the wicked because God was "the strength of his heart" and God would be to him "his portion forever." The word "portion" is another word for his reward or his inheritance. God is better than health, wealth, houses, success, earthly pleasures, or anything else.

2 Corinthians 4:16-18

Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day. 17 For our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all. 18 So we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen. For what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal

2 Corinthians 5:7 We live by faith, not by sight

Abraham – Was able to leave his home and follow God in faith because he was '**longing for a better country**—a heavenly one.' Heb 11:16

Moses – 'chose to be mistreated along with the people of God rather than to enjoy the pleasures of sin for a short time. He regarded disgrace for the sake of Christ as of greater value than the treasures of Egypt, because he was looking ahead to his reward. Heb 11:25,26

Other Saints - were tortured and refused to be released, so that they might gain a better resurrection. Heb 11:35

So we see from the 'hall of faith' in Hebrews chapter 11, that it was the sense of eternity and the longing for 'the things to come' that enabled the great saints of old to hold fast and walk in faith through their difficult times down here on earth. ---I Gordon

Conclusion

One of the keys to living a triumphant life in Christ — to living a joyous and victorious life in the midst of a world wallowing in despair — is to live with a conscious eternal perspective.

I have personally found this to be so important that I carry a reminder of it in my shirt pocket at all times. It is a small card that was sent to me in 1988 by the great prophetic preacher, Leonard Ravenhill. The card says, "Lord, keep me eternity conscious."

What does that mean? In the words of Peter, that means living as "aliens and strangers" in this world (1 Peter 2:11). Similarly, in the words of the writer of Hebrews, it means living as "strangers and exiles" on this earth (Hebrews 11: 13). Paul put it this way: "Do not set your minds on earthly things, for our citizenship is in heaven" (Philippians 3:19-20). The great Christian writer, C.S. Lewis, explained that to live with an eternal perspective means "living as commandos operating behind the enemy lines, preparing the way for the coming of the Commander-in-Chief."

2. Hell is a real place

Is There A Hell? A recent USA Today (reported in the 10/31/97 issue) poll discovered 52% of adults are certain that there is a hell, and 27% think there might be. 48% think it will be a real place where people suffer eternal torment, with 46% thinking it will be an anguished state of existence rather than an actual place. 6% indicate they don't know.

Hell as a place of punishment translates Gehenna, the Greek form of the Hebrew word that means "the valley of Hinnom"-a valley just south of Jerusalem. In this valley the Canaanites worshiped Baal and the fire-god Molech by sacrificing their children in a fire that burned continuously.

In the time of Jesus the Valley of Hinnom was used as the garbage dump of Jerusalem. Into it were thrown all the filth and

garbage of the city, including the dead bodies of animals and executed criminals. To consume all this, fires burned constantly. Maggots worked in the filth. When the wind blew from that direction over the city, its awfulness was quite evident. At night wild dogs howled and gnashed their teeth as they fought over the garbage.

Jesus used this awful scene as a symbol of hell. In effect he said, "Do you want to know what hell is like? Look at the valley of Gehenna." So hell may be described as God's "cosmic garbage dump." All that is unfit for heaven will be thrown into hell.

Hell is described as a place where "their worm does not die and the fire is not quenched." Repeatedly Jesus spoke of outer darkness and a furnace of fire, where there will be wailing, weeping, and gnashing of teeth. Obviously this picture is drawn from the valley of Gehenna.

Because of the symbolic nature of the language, some people question whether hell consists of actual fire. Such reasoning should bring no comfort to the lost. The reality is greater than the symbol. The Bible exhausts human language in describing hell. Hell is more terrible than language can express. (from Nelson's Illustrated Bible Dictionary)

Matthew 25:30

30 And throw that worthless servant outside, into the darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.'

Luke 16:19-26

19 "There was a rich man who was dressed in purple and fine linen and lived in luxury every day. 20 At his gate was laid a beggar named Lazarus, covered with sores 21 and longing to eat what fell from the rich man's table. Even the dogs came and licked his sores. 22 "The time came when the beggar died and the angels carried him to Abraham's side. The first foundation was jasper, the second sapphire, the third chalcedony, the fourth emerald, 20 the fifth sardonyx, the sixth carnelian, the seventh chrysolite, the eighth beryl, the ninth topaz, the tenth chrysoprase, the eleventh jacinth, and the twelfth amethyst. 21 The twelve gates were twelve pearls, each gate made of a single pearl. The great street of the city was of pure gold, like transparent glass. 22 I did not see a temple in the city, because the Lord God Almighty and the Lamb are its temple. 23 The city does not need the sun or the moon to shine on it, for the glory of God gives it light, and the Lamb is its lamp. 24 The nations will walk by its light, and the kings of the earth will bring their splendor into it. 25 On no day will its gates ever be shut, for there will be no night there. 26 The glory and honor of the nations will be brought into it. 27 Nothing impure will ever enter it, nor will anyone who does what is shameful or deceitful, but only those whose names are written in the Lamb's book of life.

CONCLUSION

If you ever get the opportunity to visit Egypt and the tombs and pyramids, study what was required to construct some of those monuments. But the point is, they understood to the core of their being that the afterlife was a whole lot more important than this life, and so they prepared for the afterlife during this life. God had placed eternity in their hearts.

The Big Picture God's Ultimate Intention

June 25, 2006

This will be a three part message. Today, we will look at who God is and what his ultimate plan will be. Next week, we'll discover some important principles regarding Christ and how mankind is involved in God's ultimate plan. Then, in two weeks, we'll summarize the entire Ultimate Intention and make application for us to consider.

This entire study began with a series of philosophical questions:

- Why did God create mankind?
- What is the ultimate purpose of mankind?
- If God knew we would sin, why did he create us?
- If Adam never sinned, would Christ still be necessary?

These are things I've pondered off and on for years. And recent events, with several families suffering loss, have caused these questions to resurface. In the midst of my pondering my Dad gave me a book written by a pastor he knows, titled "Ultimate Intention." It helped me a great deal in understanding these things, and this short series will draw a lot from this book.

Imagine God in eternity past:

Why would He want to create man?

This type of question has been asked for centuries:

Job 7:17

17 "What is man that you make so much of him, that you give him so much attention,

Psalms 8:4

4 what is man that you are mindful of him, the son of man that you care for him?

Scripture seems to indicate that creation is for man. The earth was created for man. Vegetation was created for man to live on. Animals were created for man to oversee. The sun, moon and stars were made to give light on the earth. So, according to Scripture, the earth is the focus of creation. The earth was created for man to live upon. And, man was given charge over it. So, man is incredibly significant in God's creation. Why?

Some possible answers:

He was lonely and wanted friendship.

- but he already had the angels

Job 38:4-7

4 "Where were you when I laid the earth's foundation? Tell me, if you understand. 5 Who marked off its dimensions? Surely you know! Who stretched a measuring line across it? 6 On what were its footings set, or who laid its cornerstone- 7 while the morning stars sang together and all the angels shouted for joy?

He wanted a "free agent" to love him, since angels didn't have a choice.

- but angels did have a choice

2 Peter 2:4

4 For if God did not spare angels when they sinned, but sent them to hell, putting them into gloomy dungeons to be held for judgment;

Jude 6

6 And the angels who did not keep their positions of authority but abandoned their own home-these he has kept in darkness, bound with everlasting chains for judgment on the great Day.

He wanted worshipers.

- but angels and other heavenly creatures already do that

Isaiah 6:1-4

6:1 In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord seated on a throne, high and exalted, and the train of his robe filled the temple. 2 Above him were seraphs, each with six wings: With two wings they covered their faces, with two they covered their feet, and with two they were flying. 3 And they were calling to one another: "Holy, holy, holy is the LORD Almighty; the whole earth is full of his glory." 4 At the sound of their voices the doorposts and thresholds shook and the temple was filled with smoke.

Revelation 5:11-12

11 Then I looked and heard the voice of many angels, numbering thousands upon thousands, and ten thousand times ten thousand. They encircled the throne and the living creatures and the elders. 12 In a loud voice they sang: "Worthy is the Lamb, who was slain, to receive power and wealth and wisdom and strength and honor and glory and praise!"

To defeat Satan with a lesser being.

This view sees Ezekiel 28 and Isaiah 14 as the story of Lucifer's rebellion and then imagines God creating man in response as a sort of challenge to Satan. It goes on to say that what Adam failed to do, Jesus achieved, and Satan was defeated by a man.

- but this view makes man nothing more than a pawn in some sort of cosmic chess match between God and

Satan. It really doesn't take into account the opening verses of this message:

Job 7:17

17 "What is man that you make so much of him, that you give him so much attention,

Psalms 8:4

4 what is man that you are mindful of him, the son of man that you care for him?

To demonstrate his love and forgiveness through salvation.

- but this implies that God made mankind sin so that he could demonstrate his goodness. This is a slippery slope that ultimately makes God out to be evil and cruel.

The bible is plain that there's punishment for sin.

Romans 6:23

23 For the wages of sin is death,

- But if God makes us sin, then he will punish us for something he caused! Plus, the Bible says that God doesn't cause us to sin anyway.

James 1:13

13 When tempted, no one should say, "God is tempting me." For God cannot be tempted by evil, nor does he tempt anyone;

God is creative, therefore, He must create.

Okay, but is there any particular reason for mankind or are we just another creature in his creative works? Again, the Scriptures indicate that there's something special about mankind:

Job 7:17

17 "What is man that you make so much of him, that you give him so much attention,

Psalms 8:4

4 what is man that you are mindful of him, the son of man that you care for him?

Here are some verses that give some insight into why God might have made man:

Isaiah 43:6-7

Bring my sons from afar and my daughters from the ends of the earth — 7 everyone who is called by my name, <u>whom I created</u> for my glory, whom I formed and made."

Colossians 1:16

16 For by him all things were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or powers or rulers or authorities; all things were created by him and for him

Romans 11:36

36 For <u>from him</u> and <u>through him</u> and <u>to him</u> are all things. To him be the glory forever! Amen.

Hebrews 2:10

10 In bringing many sons to glory, it was fitting that God, for whom and through whom everything exists, should make the author of their salvation perfect through suffering.

Revelation 4:11

11 "You are worthy, our Lord and God, to receive glory and honor and power, for you created all things, and <u>by your will</u> <u>they were created</u> and have their being." (KJV = for your pleasure they were created)

Illustration: The Little Mermaid thinks a fork is for styling hair. Ariel: What? What is it? Scuttle: It's a dinglehopper! Humans use these little babies . . . to straighten their hair out. See - just a little twirl here an' a yank there and - voiolay! You got an aesthetically pleasing configuration of hair that humans go nuts over!

In order to get some idea about this, we must first understand who God is. Is there something about God that would compel him to make man?

Why does a violin maker make violins? It could be that he simply needs to make a living and he happened to get a job at a violin shop. It could be that he simply likes to play with wood. It could be that he senses the need of violin players to make music, so he assists them by providing the violins. To really understand why the violin maker makes violins, you would need to get to know the violin maker!

So, who is God?

1. The Personality of God

Malachi 3:6 6 "I the LORD do not change.

James 1:17

17 Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of the heavenly lights, who does not change like shifting shadows.

God doesn't change. Who he is now, is who he has always been.

When studying God, the top 2 words that come up in Scripture are:

Lord = 778 times Almighty = 345 times These tell us something about God's power and authority, but don't reveal much about personality.

Creator = 10 Redeemer = 17 Savior = 52 Father = 262

Last week, for Father's day, I commented how important this "fatherhood" subject is. The word "father" is used over 1600 times in the bible; more than prayer, praise and worship all combined!

In the Gospels and Acts, Jesus preferred to call God "Father," using the name 171 times.

He taught us to pray, "Our Father..."

All of Paul's letters refer to God as "Father" in the greeting.

Ephesians 1:2 2 Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

The majority of other NT writers also use "Father" in their greetings.

Bible verses on God as father:

Psalms 68:5 <u>A father to the fatherless</u>, a defender of widows, is God in his holy dwelling.

This describes the beginning and gives some insight as to why God created man. God is a father, and as a father, he wanted sons.



Now, let's look to the future. What is God's ultimate plan for creation?

2. The Plan of God

So, God is a father who wants sons. What is his plan for his sons and all of creation?

Some immediately think of "end-time" judgment.

Revelation chapters 6 through 19 describe much of this:

War, famine, plagues, earthquakes, storms, meteor crash, drought, the mark of the beast, and the antichrist

Matthew 24 also covers some of this:

War, earthquakes, persecution of believers, increasing wickedness, unparalleled trouble, darkening of the sun, the return of Christ

But, judgment is not the ultimate end of everything:

2 Peter 3:3-13

3 First of all, you must understand that in the last days scoffers will come, scoffing and following their own evil desires. 4 They will say, "Where is this 'coming' he promised? Ever since our fathers died, everything goes on as it has since the beginning of creation." 5 But they deliberately forget that long ago by God's word the heavens existed and the earth was formed out of water and by water. 6 By these waters also the world of that time was deluged and destroyed. 7 By the same word <u>the present heavens and earth</u> <u>are reserved for fire, being kept for the day of judgment and</u> <u>destruction of ungodly men.</u>

8 But do not forget this one thing, dear friends: With the Lord a day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like a day. 9 The Lord is not slow in keeping his promise, as some understand slowness. He is patient with you, not wanting anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance. 10 But the day of the Lord will come like a thief. <u>The</u> <u>heavens will disappear with a roar; the elements will be</u> <u>destroyed by fire, and the earth and everything in it will be</u> <u>laid bare.</u>

11 Since everything will be destroyed in this way, what kind of people ought you to be? You ought to live holy and godly lives 12 as you look forward to the day of God and speed its coming. That day will bring about the destruction of the heavens by fire, and the elements will melt in the heat. 13 But in keeping with his promise we are looking forward to a new heaven and a new earth, the home of righteousness.

And God placed all things under his feet and appointed him to be head over everything for the church, 23 which is his body, the fullness of him who fills everything in every way.

Ephesians 4:10

He who descended is the very one who ascended higher than all the heavens, in order to <u>fill the whole universe</u>.

d exalted him to the highest place and gave him the name that is above every name, 10 that <u>at the name of Jesus every</u> <u>knee should bow</u>, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, 11 and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Part Four: God's Ultimate Intention July 2, 2006

Why will everything be under Christ? How is mankind involved in God's overall plan?

Did God send Christ as a reaction to man's sin? If Adam never sinned, would Christ still have come?

First, let's understand that Christ existed in eternity past.

John 1:1-2, 14

1:1 <u>In the beginning</u> was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. 2 <u>He was with God in the beginning.</u>

14 The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the One and Only, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth.

Hebrews 1:1-3

1:1 In the past God spoke to our forefathers through the prophets at many times and in various ways, 2 but in these last days he has spoken to us by his Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, and <u>through whom he made the universe</u>.

Genesis 1:26

26 Then God said, "Let <u>us</u> make man in <u>our</u> image, in our likeness

John 17:24

24 "Father, I want those you have given me to be with me where I am, and to see my glory, the glory you have given me because you loved me <u>before the creation of the world</u>.

1 Peter 1:20

20 He was chosen <u>before the creation of the world</u>, but was revealed in these last times for your sake

Revelation 13:8

8 All inhabitants of the earth will worship the beast-all whose names have not been written in the book of life belonging to the Lamb that was slain <u>from the creation of the world.</u>

So, Christ was not an afterthought on God's part as some sort of reaction to man's sin! **Christ was included in God's plan before the universe was even created**. I believe Christ would have still come to earth even if Adam never sinned; and I believe that the plan to put all things under Christ was part of the original plan whether Adam sinned or not.

Why the necessity of Christ? Why put all things under Christ?

1. The Principle of Christ

John 8:28-30

Jesus said, "When you have lifted up the Son of Man, then you will know that I am [the one I claim to be] and that I <u>do</u> <u>nothing on my own</u> but speak just what the Father has taught me. 29 The one who sent me is with me; he has not left me alone, for <u>I always do what pleases him."</u>

John 14:9-10

10 Don't you believe that I am in the Father, and that the Father is in me? <u>The words I say to you are not just my own</u>. Rather, it is the Father, living in me, who is doing his work.

Romans 6:9-10

we know that since Christ was raised from the dead, he cannot die again; death no longer has mastery over him. 10 The death he died, he died to sin once for all; but the life he lives, <u>he lives to God</u>.

Philippians 2:5-11

5 Your attitude should be the same as that of Christ Jesus: 6 Who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be grasped, 7 but <u>made himself</u> <u>nothing</u>, taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. 8 And being found in appearance as a man, he <u>humbled himself</u> and became <u>obedient to death</u>- even death on a cross! 9 *Therefore* God exalted him to the highest place and gave him the name that is above every name, 10 that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, 11 and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Hebrews 1:8-9

8 But about the Son he says, "Your throne, O God, will last for ever and ever, and righteousness will be the scepter of your kingdom. 9 You have <u>loved righteousness</u> and <u>hated</u> <u>wickedness</u>; *therefore* God, your God, has set you above your companions by anointing you with the oil of joy."

1 Corinthians 15:20-28

20 But Christ has indeed been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. 21 For since death came through a man, the resurrection of the dead comes also through a man. 22 For as in Adam all die, so in Christ all will be made alive. 23 But each in his own turn: Christ, the firstfruits; then, when he comes, those who belong to him. 24 Then the end will come, when he hands over the kingdom to God the Father after he has destroyed all dominion, authority and power. 25 For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. 26 The last enemy to be destroyed is death. 27 For he "has put everything under his feet." Now when it says that "everything" has been put under him, it is clear that this does not include God himself, who put everything under Christ. 28 When he has done this, then the Son himself will be made subject to him who put everything under him, so that God may be all in all.

So, the principle of Christ is all about his character:

- He always pleases God
- He only says what God is saying

- He lives completely to God
- He is humble and obedient
- He loves righteousness
- He hates wickedness
- He will hand over the kingdom to God

John 13:14-15

14 Now that I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also should wash one another's feet. 15 <u>I have set</u> you an example that you should do as I have done for you.

1 Corinthians 11:1

11:1 Follow my example, as I follow the example of Christ.

1 Peter 2:21-22

Christ suffered for you, leaving you an example, that <u>you</u> <u>should follow in his steps.</u> 22 "He committed no sin, and no deceit was found in his mouth."



If Adam had never sinned, Christ would still be our example. He would show us how to live entirely for God. I don't think he would have had to literally die on the Cross, but the principle of death to self and life to God would still be shown to mankind through the example of Christ.

Now, we understand God's plan from our historical view of events and it looks something like this:



Historically, the cross is more than just an example. It is the way that God has made for man to recover his lost position. Remember, originally, God wanted sons. The status of sonship was lost when Adam sinned. Now, the work of Christ on the cross makes restoration to sonship available to all of mankind. However, we can see that this is only a portion of God's overall plan. The work of the cross simply allows us to be included in God's plan again. It gets us back to the status of sonship that was lost when Adam sinned.

So, since we can be sons and be included in God's plan, what exactly is our part?

2. The Participation of Man

God's plan included mankind even before creation:

Psalms 139:16

All the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be.

Ephesians 1:4

In Eastern lands it was the practice of a noble-father to submit his infant male child to the child-training and tutelage of a trusted household servant until he should come of age. Actually, then, the child, though heir apparent, was no different from the servant to whom he must submit. During the long period of child training, it was the tutor's task to bring the child into the ways, purposes and spirit of the father of the family. Finally when the child became fourteen or sixteen years of age, it was the custom to hold a formal celebration for his coming out. This ceremony, called adoption, meant the coming of a son to his full rights in the family.

At this present hour we who are born-ones are learning to walk after the Spirit. Thus the Spirit of adoption working within is leading us more and more into the reality of sonship. ---DeVern Fromke To be a son is infinitely more than to be a child. Every born again child of God has in him the nature of his Father, and is a beloved member of his Father's family. Many think that the ultimate plan must be for us to go back to a Garden of Eden type of living. However, Adam was not all that God intended him to be. He was a son with some inheritance and some ruling authority, but it wasn't on the universal scale that God intended.



What will there be to do in Heaven on Saturday nights? If this question bothers you, you need to seriously rethink the purpose of your life. God has good reasons for your existence. And big plans. Part of that, of course, is what you do here on earth. You're not just marking time, waiting for your promotion to the Great Upstairs. You're learning to be a powerful, loving person; you're learning to defeat evil; and you're becoming a living, walking vessel who contains the very Spirit of God. Yet there is far more. Review - Part Four: God's Ultimate Intention

Why will everything be under Christ? How is mankind involved in God's overall plan?

First, let's understand that Christ existed in eternity past.

John 1:1 1:1 <u>In the beginning</u> was the Word...

Hebrews 1:2 ... through whom he made the universe.

Christ was included in God's plan before the universe was even created.

1. The Principle of Christ

The principle of Christ is all about his character:

- He always pleases God
- He only says what God is saying
- He lives completely to God
- He is humble and obedient
- He loves righteousness
- He hates wickedness
- He will hand over the kingdom to God

1 Corinthians 11:1 11:1 Follow my example, as <u>I follow the example of Christ.</u>



If Adam had never sinned, Christ would still be our example, to become all that God intended. He would show us how to live entirely for God. I don't think he would have had to literally die on the Cross, but the principle of death to self and life to God would still be shown to mankind through the example of Christ.

Now, we understand God's plan from our historical view of events and it looks something like this:



Historically, the cross is more than just an example. It is the way that God has made for man to recover his lost position. Remember, originally, God wanted sons. The status of sonship was lost when Adam sinned. Now, the work of Christ on the cross makes restoration to sonship available to all of mankind. However, we can see that this is only a portion of God's overall plan. The work of the cross simply allows us to be included in God's plan again. It gets us back to the status of sonship that was lost when Adam sinned.

2. The Participation of Man

God's plan included mankind even before creation:

Ephesians 1:4 4 For he <u>chose us in him before the creation</u> of the world...

One morning I went to the back door to call our threeyear-old son. I planned for him to go with me to town on an errand. As I opened the back door to call, I saw him – but what a predicament he was in. The little fellow had been playing in the garden and had fallen in the mud. Suddenly I realized how easily God's children can partake of His "grace" and receive His good gifts only to become wholly distracted from His original purpose.

1. A summary of God's Ultimate Intention

When I was preaching a series on Ephesians earlier this year I commented: "In this letter, Paul didn't deal with specific problems like many of his other letters did. He wrote about God's overall plan for His church and the world."

Ephesians is one of the most developed writings on Christianity and church life. As I was studying for this series, "God's Ultimate Intention," I noticed how many of the verses I was using were found in Ephesians. So, I decided to scan through the book to see if this overall picture can be found here. Sure enough it is...

I found that Ephesians 1:1 through 4:16 covers the Big Picture we've been talking about. Then, Ephesians 4:17 through 6:24 deals with our response to this Big Picture. Let's take a look at the first part to confirm God's Ultimate Intention...



Ephesians 1:2-3

2 Grace and peace to you from God our <u>Father</u> and the Lord Jesus Christ. 3 Praise be to the God and <u>Father</u> of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in the heavenly realms with every spiritual blessing in Christ.

Ephesians 1:4-5

4 For he <u>chose us in him before the creation</u> of the world to be holy and blameless in his sight. In love 5 he predestined us <u>to be adopted as his sons</u> through Jesus Christ, in accordance with his pleasure and will



Ephesians 1:9-10

he made known to us the mystery of <u>his will</u> according to his good pleasure, <u>which he purposed in Christ</u>, 10 to be put into effect when the times will have reached their fulfillmentto bring all things in heaven and on earth together under one head, even Christ.

Ephesians 2:1-10

2:1 As for you, you were dead in your transgressions and sins, 2 in which you used to live when you followed the ways of this world and of the ruler of the kingdom of the air. the spirit who is now at work in those who are disobedient. 3 All of us also lived among them at one time, gratifying the cravings of our sinful nature and following its desires and thoughts. Some things you won't see in heaven:

- People bored out of their skulls
- People with angel wings
- Disembodied spirits floating around like Halloween ghosts
- People sitting on fluffy white clouds playing harps
- Long, tedious church services

Our enthusiasm for Heaven is dampened by the gnawing fear that the archangel Gabriel might stand up next to the Throne and announce, "Welcome to Eternity! Let's get started with 12,836 hymns, followed by a few centuries of praise, then each of the 86 million pastors here will get to reprise his five favorite sermons." Here's the good news: Heaven will be far more than this. We won't have better things to do than worship God, but we'll certainly have some other things to do. When Isaiah 9:7 says that "the increase of his government will never end," it means this shared governing with Christ will be "ever-expanding." And because the acreage on any planet is limited, I would personally infer that this points to whole new worlds for us to develop and govern together. It couldn't get any more staggering than that. And it forcefully raises the question: Are you living as one who will soon be ready for that level of responsibility?

Kingdom expansion really is a God thing, not a human thing. Just be faithful to tell people about Jesus and His Kingdom, then rest in the fact that God will take it from there....

Conclusion

An Atheist farmer often ridiculed people who believed in God. Why doesn't He reward those who fear Him, and judge those who disregard Him? Be patient. He will! True, He doesn't always "settle His accounts in October," but He does settle His accounts!

3 Trust in the LORD and do good; dwell in the land and enjoy safe pasture.

Do good...

Dwell in the land...

1 Peter 2:12

Live such good lives among the pagans that, though they accuse you of doing wrong, they may see your good deeds and glorify God on the day he visits us.

How can I develop this "delight" for the Lord? "I know I should and I want to, but it's just not there yet."

Isaiah 58:13-14 (set aside time for Him)

13 "If you keep your feet from breaking the *Sabbath* and from doing as you please on my holy day, if you call the Sabbath a delight and the LORD's holy day honorable, and if you honor it by *not going your own way* and not doing as you please or speaking idle words, 14 <u>then you will find your joy in the LORD</u>, and I will cause you to ride on the heights of the land and to feast on the inheritance of your father Jacob."

Job 22:21-26 (follow Him)

21 "Submit to God and be at peace with him; in this way prosperity will come to you. 22 Accept instruction from his mouth and lay up his words in your heart. 23 If you return to the Almighty, you will be restored: If you remove wickedness far from your tent ... 25 then the Almighty will be your gold, the choicest silver for you. 26 Surely then you will find delight in the Almighty and will lift up your face to God.

For me, if I am feeling dry and the "delight" is not there... what works best is to set aside time for God, whether I feel like it or not. Sometimes I sit at the piano and worship; other times I go to Ledges and hike. For me, these work to reconnect with God. Proverbs 16:3

Verses 23-26

Meek-what does it mean? The answer lies in the word itself: M-Mighty, E-Emotionally stable, E-Educable, K-Kind. Robert Schuller

We like to think blessed are the strong, the shrewd, those who stand up for their rights, those who refuse to be taken advantage of, those who always look out for slights, those who strike it rich and make it a success. We have a tendency to put high value on self-assertion. The natural standpoint is that a strong person is one who not only does what he wills but also bends others to do his will. The Biblical concept of meekness, however, is different. Meekness in the Greek is used to describe an animal which has been trained by its master. Wild and unruly animals are worthless but when trained they become meek, that is teachable and quiet. If we remember this background of the term we will see that meekness is strength under the control of God and that gentleness is true power.

Notice all the references to inheritance in Psalm 37:

Verse 9 those who hope in the LORD will inherit the land.

Verse 18 18 The days of the blameless are known to the LORD, and their inheritance will endure forever.

Verse 22 22 those the LORD blesses will inherit the land,

Verse 27 then you will dwell in the land forever.

Verse 29 29 the righteous will inherit the land and dwell in it forever.

Verse 34 He will exalt you to inherit the land;

Verse 37 there is a future for the man of peace.

If you are meek, you are able to handle almost anything. Therefore, you will have peace. If you're proud, you can't handle an insult or criticism. If you're selfish, you can't handle it when things don't go your way. If you're envious, you can't handle it when others succeed. But when you're humble and meek, you are at perfect peace!

This life isn't fair. Things don't always go our way. Those who reject Christ and live in unrighteous ways may prosper and succeed. But, these things are only temporary. Remember the Big Picture!
