KEY SCRIPTURE

Acts 2:1-4

SYNOPSIS

The wait is over. The promise has arrived. The gift the Father promised is a Person—and Pentecost is what happens when a room that stayed gets answered.

HIGHLIGHTS



BIG IDEA

The wait is over. The promise has arrived.

The gift the Father promised isn't a phenomenon—it's a Person. The wind, the fire, the tongues are evidence the Spirit had arrived. He is the Gift.

"All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit..." (Acts 2:4)

Notes:

THE WAIT

The room held. The praying held. Nobody got bored and left. Nobody started their own thing. They stayed—together, in one place.

Acts 2:1 is the answer to Acts 1:4. Same gift. Same Father. Same promise. The wait wasn't a delay—it was a setup.

The gift came to a room that stayed.

"When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place." (Acts 2:1)

THE WIND

Luke didn't have to call it wind. Greek has other words. He picked the one that means wind—because the Spirit is at least four things at once:

Wind refreshes. The Comforter brings a breeze your body has been holding out for.

Wind destroys. Gentle with what God planted, ruthless with what the enemy planted.

Wind empowers. You weren't built to run the Christian life on your own batteries.

Wind carries. He'll move you to the next place—but you have to put the sail up.

He breathed on them in John 20. He blew through them in Acts 2.

"Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven..." (Acts 2:2)

THE WITNESS

The wind and fire are just the first five minutes. The rest of Acts 2 is one long sermon—preached by the same Peter who six weeks earlier couldn’t admit he knew Jesus.

Three thousand saved in one day. The Spirit doesn’t just fill—He sends. **Power and witness.**

They’re linked.

“You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses...”
(Acts 1:8)

MAKE IT PERSONAL

Have you received the gift the Father promised—not just believed in Jesus, but stepped into the fullness of what He came to give?

In Ephesians 5:18, “be filled with the Spirit” is present tense—be being filled. Ongoing. **The gift is still being given.**

“The promise is for you and your children and for all who are far off...” (Acts 2:39)
